- Main tasks so far:

  - Helping craft the *TrueNorthland* website (coming soon)
- Visioning Process:

Nicole Foster and Garret Zastoupil are organizing the two "Open Space" visioning meetings this week.

• "All Hands on Deck" metaphor-driven work plan through April 3rd

I also second Leia Nymo's suggestion that we channel Shackleton and his crew on the 1914 voyage of the *Endurance*—they never lost hope, even though their situation seemed impossible.
