Here's the "All Hands on Deck update" (3/25, 2200hr)

It's been two weeks since the Northland College President and Trustees rocked our world with their surprise announcement that we must raise \$12M in 23 days or risk closure of our school. The shock knocked us back on our heels for a couple of days, but we quickly collected our wits, and organized ourselves. The strength of our community is on full display.

Community support continues to sustain us. **Thank you** to Sara, Paige, Mandy, and crew from the City of Ashland Parks & Recreation Department, who raised over \$20,000 during their "Save Northland Party" Friday night. **Thank you** to the bands who played, the businesses and individuals who contributed to the silent auction, and the people who prepared and donated food and beverages. **Thank you** to Em, L, Sofia, and Audrey, members of the NCSA Care Crew, who cooked and delivered delicious soup, bread, and GinGins candy on Saturday as we put in a long day of compiling data, drafting a plan, and conducting focus groups. **Thank you** to Jean, Peg, Audra, Alden, Phoebe, Karsten, Sally, Kristen, Lilly, and Greta--the neighborhood kids who raised \$332.15 through bake sales. **Thank you** to Cole and Annalee who, as I was starting to write this update, texted to ask if they could shovel my snow.

Progress Made:

The GinGins (a.k.a. the Faculty ad hoc response committee) continue to focus on developing *True Northland*, a financially sustainable, mission centric model.

- Earlier this morning we shared a draft of True Northland with the campus community.
- We developed this draft from the data that came from the three visioning sessions last week.
 - o Two focus groups help us "Truth Test" and refine the draft—one on Saturday with students, staff and faculty, and one on Sunday with faculty, staff, and alumni.
 - After each focus group, we worked to incorporate the feedback and refine the draft.
 The document we sent out this morning was *much* improved because of the
 feedback we received—thank you to those who spent your weekend involved in this
 project.
- This afternoon we hosted two online meetings to discuss the draft and hear comments, questions, and reactions.
 - A total of 86 participants joined online.
 - We were thrilled to have members of the Bad River, Menomonee, and Oneida Nations join the discussion. Miigwech!
 - If you have any input to share, whether or not you were able to join a call, we've set up an email address to collect feedback: <u>TrueNorthland.feedback@gmail.com</u> We'll remove all identifying information, compile the feedback, and make it available.
- True Northland timeline for edits, and roll-out
 - The GinGins are working to incorporate feedback and create a 2-page Executive Summary
 - Look for an updated and public version tomorrow (Tuesday)
 - The Faculty Council meets tomorrow and we will discuss next steps

Groups that self-organized through the "<u>All Hands on Deck</u>" metaphor-driven work plan are moving full steam ahead:

- Northland Forever a group that "aims to gather and unite alumni to create positive change for Northland during a troubled period of its existence"
 - Gathered over \$95K from 141 pledges, as of 6pm tonight. They are an "alternative fundraising venue that is controlled by alumni instead of Trustees."
 - o Work Groups are now available through Northland Forever
 - o Email pressure campaign
- Save Northland a student-run group, has produced beautiful videos of Northlanders telling their stories—why they love it here; what this school and community means to them; why it's worth saving.
- The Student Organizing Committee
 - Continues to plan the April 3 7 "Camp In." The start of this event coincides with the day the Trustees have set as the "deadline"
 - o Care Crew continues to support our community. They have sign-ups for helpers and for people who could use some help.
